Mary Maye Morgan, 74, passed away Monday, April 8, 2024. Born in Burke County, NC on January 27, 1950, she was the daughter of the late James "Jim" Maye and Ruby Whisenant Maye. She always considered herself a life time member of First Baptist Church in Morganton where she grew up. Mary retired from First Union National Bank in Charlotte after 25 years. She moved quickly in 1974 from night shift key punch operator to manager of both shifts in the key punch area. Her skill level and ability to manage people as well as job responsibilities got the recognition of the IT department and she rose up to that challenge. Within just a couple of years she was managing a group of Operations Analyst in Charlotte and Jacksonville Florida. She gained the status of "Vice President" and began managing merger projects. Over the following years she project-managed over 95 First Union mergers with other banks.

After retirement, she did some consultant work, worked briefly with ATI, and then was invited back to manage the merger from First Union to Wachovia Bank.

Even as challenging as her job was, she was able to also be a great wife and lifetime partner in her marriage, a loving mother to her one son, and to declare every morning that Jesus was her savior and God. She was an avid reader, kept up with politics, loved nature and to swim in the ocean and lie on the beach. She and Greg her husband, explored multiple Appalachian Mountain trails, caverns, waterfalls, and loved the Linville Hunt Club trails and the surrounding Pisgah National Forest. Mrs. Morgan is survived by her husband of 48 years, Gregory Allen Morgan, her son Gregory Allen Morgan II., and wife Lisa, and sisters-in-law Carolyn Somers of Greenville SC, Stephanie Earlene Bowers Maye of Morganton. Her 1st cousin Karen Lowdermilk and husband Roy Lowdermilk of Morganton, always called her "Sissy", she and Karen were more like sisters than cousins.

In addition to her parents, Mary was preceded in death by two brothers, William "Bill" Sommers and Thomas "Tom" Maye.

The family will receive friends from 10:30 to 11 a.m., Saturday, April 20, 2024 at Sossoman Funeral Home. The memorial service will follow at 11 a.m. in the Colonial Chapel of the funeral home with Rev. Joseph Holland officiating. Interment of the cremated remains will follow in Forest Hill Cemetery.
